Support a second phase of Strengthening the Institutional Capacity of the AHA Centre for ASEAN Disaster Capacity Building Programme (SICAP) focused on further enhancing the AHA Centre's e-learning management system, updating its knowledge management guidelines and standard operating procedures and developing a monitoring, evaluation and learning system.	Action: MFAT intends to consolidate future International Development Cooperation (IDC) support into one medium-term (3-5 years) funding arrangement. This will require a new Activity design, including an overarching Theory of Change and a robust MERL framework to support achieving better development outcomes of the new phases of SICAP and AHA Centre Executive Leadership in Emergency and Disaster Management Programme (ACE-LEDMP). The design should:  - take into account the results of completed and planned evaluations of these programmes, and the ASEAN Capacity Building Roadmap (2025-2030) on Disaster Management (developed by SICAP phase 1);  - further strengthen ASEAN - New Zealand connections (refer to Recommendation 4);  - ensure mutually agreed benefits.

Action: A new Thematic Short Term Training Course for the ASEAN region is currently being developed, with an aim to share relevant NZ's expertise, and to build and strenghten the relationships between NZ and ASEAN DRM professionals.  For any new initiatives, MFAT will explore options for strengthening the ASEAN-NZ connections, including but not limited to a study visit to NZ. These will be considered in the design of a new activity (refer to actions for Recommendations 2 and 3).
