PARTNERING FOR IMPACT: A NEW APPROACH TO ENGAGING WITH NGOS

Partnering for Impact is a new approach to engaging with NGOs to achieve greater development impact in the Pacific and beyond. It is comprised of three complementary mechanisms: Negotiated Partnerships; a new streamlined contestable fund - Manaaki; and a civil society organisational strengthening mechanism for the Pacific and Timor Leste. This new way of working is informed by an evaluation of the previous Partnerships for International Development Fund (PFID), extensive consultation with civil society (including in-country) and a consideration of the approaches taken by other international donors. MFAT is investing up to \$70m in the 2018-2021 triennium to disburse through our new funding mechanisms - this includes existing PFID commitments of \$48m.
