Re: Exchange of Letter Regarding Extension of Joint Commitment for Development (JCfD) Indonesia – New Zealand

Excellency,

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter dated 15<sup>th</sup> June 2022 concerning the New Zealand – Indonesia Joint Commitment for Development between the Government of New Zealand and the Government of Indonesia signed in Jakarta on 20<sup>th</sup> December 2016 (the "Commitment"), which is due to expire on 30<sup>th</sup> June 2022 read as follows:

Dear Excellency, Mr Scenaider Clasein Hasudungan Siahaan,

I have the honour to refer to the New Zealand – Indonesia Joint Commitment for Development between the Government of New Zealand and the Government of Indonesia signed in Jakarta on 20 December 2016 (the "Commitment") which is due to expire on 30 June 2022.

I confirm that it is the understanding of the Government of New Zealand, at the request of the Government of Indonesia, that the Commitment will be extended. This will require a number of amendments to be made to the Commitment to ensure it remains fit for purpose, as follows:

1. The "Priorities" in the Commitment will be deleted and replaced with:

"The majority of New Zealand's development cooperation in Indonesia will focus on the following priorities and outcomes:

# Renewable Energy

- Increased and equitable access to affordable energy (from renewables);
- Increased renewable energy production (particularly geothermal production) and contribution to the energy mix;
- Increased workforce skills and capability in renewable energy;
- A faster growing contribution from renewable energy towards green growth.

Agriculture...

#### Agriculture

- Improved economic returns, food security and resilience from productive, sustainable, and climate-smart agricultural practices;
- Increased workforce skills and capability in agriculture.

#### Disaster Resilience

Improved regional, national and community preparedness for future disasters;

- Increased workforce skills and capability in disaster resilience.

## Knowledge and Skills

- Scholars and students successfully gain skills and qualifications and contribute to development in Indonesia;
- Increased economic returns and social development through applied development-based research.

#### Inclusive Development

- Improved human capital for local government and civil society to implement inclusive development services for women, children, youth, people living with disabilities, minority ethnicities and remote communities in eastern Indonesia.
- 2. The dates on which the Commitment will take effect will be deleted and replaced with:

"July 1st 2017 until December 31st 2024"

- 3. Annex 1 ("Priorities and Commitments") of the Commitment will be deleted and replaced with the attached Annex 1.
- 4. Annex 2 ("Context and Monitoring Results") will be deleted and replaced with the attached Annex 2.
- 5. Annex 3 ("Results Diagram") of the Commitment will be deleted.

If the above amendments to the Commitment are acceptable to the Government of Indonesia, I have the honour to suggest that this letter and your Excellency's reply to that effect constitute an understanding between our two Governments, which will come into effect on the date of your reply.

# Profile of Assistance

A total aid flow profile for Indonesia will be updated and discussed annually. This will outline all resources under the Indonesian bilateral allocation, and investment priority level, multi country, and New Zealand partnerships (through state sector, private sector and NGO funding).

The majority of New Zealand's assistance will be through the Indonesia bilateral allocation in a number of defined investment priorities outlined in this Commitment in Annex One. The objective is to improve focus, reduce dispersal and focus on larger, long-term investments.

New Zealand will also assist with humanitarian and disaster relief contributions where requested, reflecting responses from other donors.

The understandings set out by New Zealand and Indonesia in the Joint Commitment for Development are made with the best endeavours in the spirit of partnership.

#### Monitoring Results

New Zealand and Indonesia will hold joint reviews of performance, focusing on achievements, constraints, and the extent to which planned outputs have contributed to good outcomes and delivery of results in each of the priorities outlined in Annex One.

There will also be regular Ministerial dialogues to review results, and consider any emerging priorities, while being mindful of the need to maintain focus and avoid excessive dispersal of the aid programme. Any mutually decided amendment to the priorities and commitments will be in writing.
