

AEC 2025 New Focus Areas: Good Governance

- □ ASEAN recognizes the need to continue engaging the various stakeholders to build a more dynamic AEC 2025:
 - Greater transparency in the public sector and in engaging with the private sector; and
 - ii. Enhance engagement with the private sector as well as other stakeholders.

GRP in the AEC Blueprint 2025

- Characteristic of "A Competitive, Innovative and Dynamic ASEAN"; and
- Element B7 "Effective, Efficient, Coherent and Responsive Regulations and Good Regulatory Practice".

The element of GRP was also stressed in the Master Plan on ASEAN Connectivity (MPAC) 2025 as one of 5 strategic areas namely Regulatory Excellence.






ASEAN-OECD GRPN



1st GRPN Meeting: 12 March 2015 – Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia

- Attended by 40 senior officials.
- Discussion on the region post-2015 work programme on GRP.
- Approved TOR.



ASEAN-OECD GRPN



2nd GRPN Meeting: 16 March 2016 – Vientiane, Lao PDR

- Attended by 60 senior officials.
- Endorsed a proposal of a two year project (2016-2018) to investigate linkages between SMEs and GVCs in Southeast Asia.
- Recognised that ASEAN has addressed GRP specifically by addressing tariff barriers amongst AMS.
- Agreed on the importance of engagement with other bodies, such as ERIA, APEC and ADB.

ASEAN-OECD GRPN



3rd GRPN Meeting: 14 March 2017 – Iloilo City, Philippines

- Attended by 80 senior officials.
- Theme: "Fostering Connectivity and Regional Competitiveness through Good Regulatory Practices".
- Focused on business registration, reducing administrative burdens and cutting red tape, and fostering SME integration in Global Value Chains to further help guide ASEAN member countries in future reforms.

MALAYSIA'S EXPERIENCE



Impact of GRP

Removing unnecessary rules

(29 business licenses were abolished)

- ✓ Reduce compliance cost (735 business licenses were re-engineered involving cost savings of RM729 million)
- ✓ Reduce cumbersome and bureaucratic procedures (454 business licenses were simplified and composited)











- ✓ Increase process efficiency (8% increase in process efficiency due to shorter waiting time)
- ✓ Reduce approval time (59% reduction in approval time)
 - ✓ Reduce procedures (29% reduction in number of procedures)
- Lowering regulatory burden allows companies to operate more efficiently

(217 business licenses were automated)

Provides a systematic guideline based on best practices adopted from other countries



Best Practice Regulation Handbook

Tool to facilitate the implementation of Best Practice Regulation system and provides detailed guidance for the implementation

Summarised version of Best Practice Regulation



Guideline on Public Consultation Procedures
