PURPOSE

To seek approval to authorise the drafting of regulations to amend the Russia Sanctions Regulations 2022 to: implement proposed designations of Belarusian individuals and entities, for their role in supporting Russia's invasion of Ukraine; and attend to minor administrative amendments.

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Russia Sanctions – Belarus Political and Military Leaders Pito matua – Key points

- The Russia Sanctions Act allows for the imposition of sanctions on other countries that are assisting Russia.
- Belarus has assisted Putin's invasion of Ukraine by actively enabling Russian forces to use its territory to: (i) enter Ukraine, (ii) launch missile attacks into Ukraine, (ii) refuel and store Russian military equipment and (iv) by allowing Russian military aircraft to use its airspace. Belarus' assistance to Russia has facilitated the devastation seen in Ukraine to date, drawing global condemnation as well as the punitive sanctions imposed on Belarusian leaders and entities by partners.
- To date we have placed travel bans on Belarusian leaders, imposed prohibitions on Belarusian government and military aircraft or ships from entering New Zealand, and included Belarus in trade measures taken in response to the invasion of Ukraine.
- This proposed tranche will expand our sanctions list to include up to 30 additional Belarusian political and military leaders, as well as any Belarusian defence entities for which we are able to establish links to Russian military. Belarusian President Lukashenko is currently subject to a travel ban under the Immigration Act, relating to election integrity and human rights issues in Belarus in 2021. We will seek to designate him under the Russia Sanctions Act. We will also propose to extend prohibitions to those Belarusians already designated with only travel bans applied.
- Advice will be provided to the Minister of Foreign Affairs proposing the specific actors to be considered for designation, and proposing amendments to the substantive text of the Regulations to:
 - provide for the inclusion of the Kiwisaver Act 2006 and the Fisheries Act 1996 to the list of Acts in section 31 of the Russia Sanctions Act 2022 in order to bolster the effectiveness of the Russia Sanctions Act and Regulations.
 - to remove reference to the now revoked HS code 8903.92 in Schedule 3.
- Approval is sought to authorise the drafting of regulations to amend the Russia Sanctions Regulations in order to implement both the proposed designations and refinements to the Regulations.
- We propose the following timeline for action:

11 May: Advice on proposed designations and draft regulations to the Minister of

Foreign Affairs; with agreement to those reccomendations contingent on

receipt of policy approval from Ministers with Power to Act

12 May: Policy approval from Ministers with Power to Act to proceed with drafting

regulations;

16 May: Executive Council;

19 May: Gazetting and public notification;

20 May: Entry into force of regulations.
