Strategic Foreign Policy Assessment to 2035: Release of Unclassified Version

- 1 **noted** that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade has completed its three-yearly Strategic Foreign Policy Assessment;
- 2 noted the classified version of the Strategic Foreign Policy Assessment to 2035 Navigating a shifting world - Te whakatere i tētahi ao hurihuri (the Strategic Assessment), attached to the paper under ERS-23-SUB-0036;
- 3 **authorised** the Prime Minister, the Minister of Defence and the Minister of Foreign Affairs to approve:
 - 3.1 the final content of both the classified and unclassified versions of the Strategic Assessment;
 - 3.2 the release of the unclassified version, including the timing of its release and sequencing with other national security products.

Release of an unclassified version of the Strategic Foreign Policy Assessment to 2035

Proposal

- 1 I propose the public release of an unclassified version of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs) MFAT's Strategic Foreign Policy Assessment to 2035 '*Navigating a shifting world - Te whakatere i tētahi ao hurihuri*' ("the Strategic Assessment").
- 2 An unclassified version is being prepared for public release in late July, following consultation with the Prime Minister.
- 3 A copy of the classified version of the Strategic Assessment is attached at Annex I for information.

Relation to government priorities

- 4 To effectively pursue Aotearoa New Zealand's foreign policy priorities, a strong domestic understanding of the increasingly challenging global environment is essential. An unclassified Strategic Assessment will usefully build greater public understanding of New Zealand's foreign policy choices; provide a reliable point of reference for New Zealanders in a time of growing mis- and dis-information and also provide insights into how Manatū Aorere brings a Te Ao Māori perspective to its mahi.
- 5 The Strategic Assessment is an MFAT agency document. Its purpose is to identify and analyse shifts in Aotearoa New Zealand's strategic environment and the potential implications for, and impacts on, New Zealand's foreign, trade and development policy.
- 6 MFAT's analysis of the shifts in the strategic environment help provide context for New Zealand's national security settings, therefore the Strategic Assessment is being considered with other national security papers also proposed for public release to ensure coherence of analysis and to manage risks for New Zealand.

Background

- 7 MFAT has completed its three-yearly Strategic Assessment. The time horizon for the assessment is 2035. Key components of the Strategic Assessment are summarised on the A3 (Annex II).
- 8 The Strategic Assessment (Annex 1) was released to MFAT staff and some NZ Inc agencies in March 2023. It provides a frank analysis of the global context to 2035, supporting coherence and consistency across government in understanding New Zealand's evolving strategic context, informed by extensive consultation with staff,



NZ Inc agencies, and Te Hurumanu (the Ministry's Māori Partnership Group). A call for public submissions was also made and sixteen written and one verbal submission were received.

9 An unclassified version of the Strategic Assessment for public release is being prepared in consultation with NZ Inc agencies.

Structure

- 10 The Strategic Assessment is made up of a number of substantive elements, including
 - 10.1 A discussion of New Zealand's place in the world and how it informs the Ministry's foreign policy, trade and development priorities, interests, values and influence.
 - 10.2 A framing of the shifting strategic context within which New Zealand will operate over the coming decade.
 - 10.3 An assessment of how New Zealand's interests will be impacted and consideration of ways to mitigate challenges and leverage opportunities.

Substance

- 11 Globally, and particularly in the Indo-Pacific, New Zealand for decades enjoyed a favourable strategic environment, including peaceful and stable inter-state relations, economic growth. Broadly accepted rules and norms have underpinned both regional and national security and economic progress.
- 12 Long-held assumptions are less certain and some no longer hold. The global outlook is clouded by heightened strategic tension, disruption and risk. The international order within which New Zealand must engage to advance our interests is shifting. The Strategic Assessment identifies three key shifts:
 - 12.1 from *rules to power*: A shift towards a world where the existing rules and norms of the international system are being increasingly challenged, often eroded, and too frequently disregarded.
 - 12.2 from *economics to security*: Economic relationships are being reassessed in dight of a more militarised, more securitised, less stable world.

from *efficiency to resilience:* We have seen a new form of global growth emerge, predicated on building greater resilience and addressing pressing social and sustainability issues. From "just in time to just in case" – and potentially and worryingly to protectionism.

13 In this changing strategic environment it New Zealand will face a number of significant foreign policy challenges over the coming decade. While many of these challenges are not new and are increasingly reported by media, New Zealand will need to grapple with increasing risk and complexity across these challenges, and make potentially difficult trade-offs. How we balance pursuit of our interests with the values we bring to our foreign policy will be particularly challenging.

14 The Strategic Assessment also considers a range of issues that will be critical to maximising New Zealand's foreign policy, trade and development opportunities, influence and impact in the period ahead. While it provides direction, it does not itself propose specific responses to the challenges identified.

Process for development of the internal version of the Strategic Assessment

- 15 The classified version of the Strategic Assessment was drafted using a collective and collaborative approach, with extensive internal and external consultation undertaken.
- 16 In June 2022, MFAT issued a call for public submissions from members of the public, Māori and interested stakeholders to inform the Assessment. Submitters were invited to comment on what they considered to be important changes occurring in the world and the implications for New Zealand, our region, people, prosperity, environment and safety, as well as respond to any of a set of specific questions.
- 17 One verbal and sixteen written submissions were received from a range of individuals and organisations. A summary of the themes raised in these public submissions will be published on the MFAT website in due course. All the key themes from these submissions are addressed in the Strategic Assessment text,

Unclassified version

18 The public, unclassified version is currently being consulted with relevant agencies. While it will follow a similar structure to the classified version of the Strategic Assessment, it will be edited to the classification level, and to ensure accessibility of document to the public. s6(a)

19 The purpose of the unclassified version is to increase transparency and assist the public in understanding the Ministry's view of its global operating environment. In order to ensure it is fit for public release, and to increase the document's readership and consumption, it will be streamlined, with a focus on using plain English and accessible language.

Tirohanga Māori / Tiriti o Waitangi

20 The Strategic Assessment considered the Treaty of Waitangi / Tiriti o Waitangi in its development. Incorporating a tangible tirohanga Māori was a priority. The Strategic Assessment looks to affirm the international relevance of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and the Treaty partnership.

The risks of release and management

21 The content of the unclassified version of the Strategic Assessment is being carefully prepared to mitigate possible risks, including relationship risks with partner countries. It is being calibrated to focus on issues that will contribute to a public conversation on foreign policy and our changing world. While the challenging strategic context highlighted in the Strategic Assessment will likely attract media interest, nothing in

- 22 While the underlying assessments are consistent, the Strategic Assessment differs from other national security documents being considered by ERS on 21 June in that it provides a broader overview of changes in the world – focusing on foreign, trade and development policy, and assessing impacts across the domains of planet, peace, people, prosperity and partnerships, where security is one component rather than the
