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I refer to your email of 21 May 2024 in which you request the following under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA):

please provide all written advice, notes, aides-memoire, briefings, and reports produced regarding the civil unrest in New Caledonia from 13 May 2024 to 21 May 2024.

On 29 May 2024, we contacted you seeking to refine your request to be for:

Situation Reports (SitReps) relating to New Caledonia unrest provided to the Minister of
Foreign Affairs dated 13 May 2024 to 21 May 2024 (inclusive).

On 10 June 2024, we sent you a follow up email asking if you were still interested in information regarding the recent civil unrest in New Caledonia.

You responded on the same day, seeking to refine your request to be for:

Situation Reports (SitReps) relating to New Caledonia unrest provided to the Minister of
Foreign Affairs dated 13 May 2024 to 10 June 2024 (inclusive).

We responded to you on 12 June 2024, confirming our agreement of your refined request

On 8 July 2024, the timeframes for responding to your request were extended by an additional 20 working days because responding to your request necessitated the review of a large quantity of information (section 15A(1)(a) of the OIA refers).

The first SitRep relating to the unrest in New Caledonia is dated 14 May 2024. There were no SitReps prior to this date. The final SitRep relating to the unrest in New Caledonia is dated 28 May 2024. There were no SitReps after this date. Therefore we refuse your request for SitReps for 13 May 2024, and for the period 29 May 2024 to 10 June 2024, under section 18(e) of the OIA, as the information you requested does not exist.

The information in scope of your request is set out in the document schedule in annex one.

The information relevant to your request is attached. We have withheld some information under the following sections of the OIA:

- 6(a): to avoid prejudicing the security or defence of New Zealand or the international relations of the New Zealand Government;
- 6(b)(i): to protect the passing of information from another government on a confidential basis;

- 6(b)(ii): to protect the passing of information from an international organisation on a confidential basis;
- 9(2)(a): to protect individuals' privacy;

- 9(2)(g)(i): to protect the free and frank expression of opinions by departments.

Where the information has been withheld under section 9 of the OIA, we have identified no public interest in releasing the information that would override the reasons for withholding it.

# **RĀPOPOTO - SUMMARY**

The security situation in New Caledonia has sharply deteriorated in the last 24 hours, and particularly overnight. While the day of 13 May saw relatively contained road blockages (although still accompanied by burning tyres and rubbish bins) on the outside of town, overnight there have been reports of significant destruction and large fires including in Noumea city. Confirmed details at this stage are limited, and we will report further as this information becomes available.

The French High Commission has called on everyone in the Noumea area to stay at home if possible. New Caledonian Government officials believe the situation could get worse tonight when voting in Paris on the proposal to expand New Caledonia's electoral roll is set to take place. The High Commission has put a curfew in place for the evening of 14 May to be in effect from 6am to 6pm. This may be extended for further nights if required.

As a result of the situation, a decision has been taken to postpone the Minister's visit to the territory. NOU is not yet aware of any New Zealanders requiring assistance.

Key developments

During the day of May 13 there was some small protest action, and a number of

- road blocks (often accompanied by burning tyres or rubbish bins) were established by protesters across the territory, including on main roads into Noumea.
- Reports are still coming in via media of events overnight, and we have not received a comprehensive read out from the French High Commission. Below is an overview of key developments:
  - A number of fires were lit by protesters in locations across the Noumea city area. These are under control this morning, but we have heard reports of fires still burning in some areas outside the city (notably the Mont Dore area which is known for frequent road blockages and violence directed towards police and security forces).
  - A number of road blocks remain in place, and we understand that travel between Noumea and the airport is not currently possible.
  - The airport has been closed and flights in and out of the territory have been postponed. This includes a flight scheduled for Auckland this morning. We have not yet been contacted by any New Zealanders requiring assistance as a result of this flight delay.
  - The French High Commission has issued a public statement confirming that a number of security officers have been injured overnight and that 36 arrests were made. At this stage there are no serious injuries to members of the public reported.

- A curfew has been put in place in Noumea to be in effect from 6pm tonight until 6am Wednesday morning, and the High Commission is calling on people to remain at home today if possible. There is a temporary ban on the sale of alcohol and the carrying of any firearms in the Noumea area. All schools are closed.

## Staff welfare

- All consulate staff are currently safe and have been advised to work from home, where possible. DM PACPF and our additional support officer from Wellington are also safe in their hotels.
- Two staff members <sup>s9(2)(a)</sup> had already shifted into hotels in the city in preparation for the Minister's visit.

## Consular

- As noted above, Air Calin flights in and out of New Caledonia have been postponed for today. This includes a flight bound for Auckland this morning.
- We are issuing new Safe Travel messaging this morning advising New Zealanders to stay in place and follow directions from local authorities. New Zealanders due to travel should contact their airline.
- We are not at this stage aware of any New Zealanders requiring assistance.

Areas of greater Noumea continued to experience significant unrest and violence despite the imposition of a curfew from 6pm to 6am. Information about the extent of violence continues to be patchy, and we have yet to receive a comprehensive briefing from the French High Commission. However, the situation is clearly worsening. There are growing concerns about inability to access food, medicines and the ability of emergency services to meet all needs (including emergency medical services). This was highlighted by the High Commissioner in his latest press conference at 3.45pm (local time) in which he warned that the current trajectory would see the territory head "straight into war".

President of the Province Sud and prominent pro-France politician Sonia Backès has written to the French President requesting the declaration of a state of emergency in the territory – this would be the first time a state of emergency has been declared in New Caledonia since 1984. This would allow the State to implement greater restrictions on movement, and deploy the armed forces if required.

# **Key developments**

In New Caledonia

- After the first serious injuries, including one death, were reported overnight after gunfire in the commune of Païta (north of Noumea), the day of 15 May has also seen two Kanak killed by members of the public claiming to be local militia in the Noumea outer suburb of Ducos.
- Areas of Magenta, Dumbéa, Mont Dore, on the outskirts of Noumea city continued to experience violence and clashes between protestors and police. The commune of Païta has also been the site of gunfire exchange between protestors and police forces.
- In those areas that have been badly affected by ongoing large fires, notably around the areas of Dumbea and Normandie, air quality is extremely poor.
- The French High Commission has reported that 130 people have been detained/arrested since the start of the unrest and around 60 gendarmes/police have been injured.
- In New Caledonia, there are currently around 1,000 gendarmes and 700 police officers, plus 7 squadrons of gendarmes (around 470) who have arrived as reinforcements from mainland France. That does not include members of the Raid and GIGN (see previous SITREP). A new convoy has been requested as a matter of urgency by the High Commissioner, and is due to arrive shortly from mainland France.
- Family members of gendarmes (often a target for violence) have been evacuated.
- The French Armed Forces have currently been tasked only with maintaining the security of the international airport and air base. The High Commissioner does not rule out further deploying military forces to other areas.
- While violence largely remains restricted to the outer areas of Noumea, overnight the President of the Loyalty Islands Province has also confirmed that the offices of the provincial government on the island of Maré were targeted.
- Over 2,500 passengers are estimated to be impacted by the cancellation of flights between now and Friday 17, when the airport is currently scheduled to reopen (though this remains subject to the evolution of the security situation and the ability for the French authorities to reopen the roads). It is not yet clear whether all passengers who have missed flights over the past few days will be able to be rebooked on currently scheduled flights on Friday 17 or Saturday 18 May, or whether airlines may look to put on additional flights. NOU is coordinating directly with Air New Zealand and airport authorities on the situation at Tontouta.
- All domestic flights have also been cancelled for today 15 May and it is not yet clear when they will restart. Ferries between Noumea and the outer islands (Loyalty Islands and Isle of Pines) have also been suspended until "the situation returns to normal".
- Schools have been instructed to remain closed until further notice. Some have been damaged by arson and this may impact their ability to reopen s9(2)(a)
- The majority of shops including supermarkets, pharmacies, and petrol stations remain closed. There are large queues of people outside those that are open.
- We are not aware of any shortages of essential items at this stage, however given the road blocks still in place this may impact ability for fuel to be transported from the main distribution centre (located outside of Noumea).

- To overcome road blockages between Mont Dore and the city, the Province Sud has put on boats to allow people to move to Noumea if required.
- In some local communities, residents have started setting up counter-blockades in an attempt to prevent damage to their homes and businesses. s6(a)

Given the high

proportion of the population with firearms, there is increasing risk of violence between different groups of the population.

# From Paris

- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal has called on local actors to "take the extended hand" and respond positively to President Emmanuel Macron's invitation for a meeting in Paris. Pro-France politician Sonia Backès has indicated her willingness to participate and suggested that a meeting could take place as early as 27 May.
- The French National Assembly (lower house of Parliament) adopted the proposed text to expand the local electoral roll in New Caledonia (351 for, 153 against), despite a vote in New Caledonia's Congress on Monday calling for the text to be withdrawn immediately in order to allow more time for local discussions to continue. s6(a)

Many called on the Government to arrange a "dialogue mission", potentially led by the UN, to help restart negotiations.

 Meanwhile, Macron has stated that, in the absence of local consensus or movement on negotiations, France will move ahead with the final stage to open the electoral roll – the Congress of Versailles uniting the two houses of Parliament – by the end of June.

#### Staff welfare

- Staff are currently all safe. However, the current situation is heavily impacting local staff ability to work (including assisting with consular caseloads).
- Seconded staff report having enough food and water for around 1 more week.
   There are limited opportunities to restock, and this may become more difficult if the situation continues.
- The immediate areas around the Chancery, as well as the HOP and DHOP residences, remain calm and largely unaffected by the unrest (although many shops in the areas are closed). DHOP visited the Chancery today and performed normal security checks.

- NOU spoke to hotel management to check arrangements. The hotel has confirmed
  that it has put additional rotating security in place every day from 3pm to 7am.
  They have a locked perimeter with guarded gates. We have checked on the food
  situation and the hotel says they have enough for at least 72 hours within the
  hotel, and they have supplies off site which they hope they can use to replenish.
- We are seeking information from the French High Commission regarding stocks of essential medicines, fuel and food. s6(a)
- NOU remains in close contact with our diplomatic corps colleagues, especially

Australia but are also coordinating together with Japan, Vanuatu, Indonesia, and SPC.

A state of emergency has been declared by the French Government [EUR/PAR reporting of 16/05/2024 refers] – the first since 1984. # Key developments

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
  - French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". - In his press conference yesterday, the French High Commissioner noted that the route to the airport remains unpassable. The High Commissioner said he would much prefer that tourists are stuck in their hotels, than risk their lives trying to get to the airport. [Note – this is why the airport remains closed]

- The French Armed Forces have been tasked with establishing an airbridge between Tontouta airport and the domestic airport Magenta.
- The High Commissioner estimated that there were likely around 4,000 people actively involved in the riots in the greater Noumea area. Most of these are between 15 and 25 years old.

In Noumea

The main Tontouta airport will remain closed until at least 9am on Tuesday 21 May. The New Caledonian Government who is responsible for commercial flights (as opposed to security which is a French jurisdiction) has confirmed that reestablishing commercial flights is their priority once the road has been re-opened. There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely unable to be accessed, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. These notably include suburbs that must be passed through in order to reach the airport. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.

- The French Armed Forces have been tasked with securing the domestic Magenta airport, however, this has not yet been achieved. At around 5pm local time Friday, the military were attacked by rioters throwing hammers and stones. Security forces used tear gas and stun grenades in response. s6(a), s9(2)(g)(i)

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement

to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favorable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political pro-independence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.

"This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."

"We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes the mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."

- News agencies have reported the Chambre des Metiers, an important business association, has been targeted by arson.
- There were initially concerns of looming food shortages, however the French authorities have reassured us that the situation is under control.
- The French High Commission confirmed also that 47 containers of food arrived on a ship in Noumea harbour yesterday, a further 56 containers are expected to arrive today (these contain food and medications). - Most stores in the area are pretty much empty and shops in some outer suburbs which have been looted and burnt.

# Key media messages

In Noumea

New Zealand and Australian assisted departure flights proposed for tomorrow (Sunday 19 May) were not approved by the Noumea authorities on security grounds. We were told

that Sunday is in fact the busiest day so far in the crisis for the French resupply and military deployments with near constant flights between Magenta and Tontouta international airport.

- There were serious clashes again overnight, particularly around Magenta. The Magenta airfield fell victim to rioters, and exchanges with military personnel were heard. The French Armed Forces have been tasked with securing the domestic Magenta airport. Yesterday at 5pm local time, the military were attacked by rioters throwing hammers and stones. Security forces used tear gas and stun grenades in response. \*\*s6(a)\*
- Heightened tensions in Dumbéa and Païta (areas that need to be passed through to gain access to Tontouta airport). The main Tontouta airport will remain closed until at least 9am on Tuesday 21 May. The New Caledonian Government has confirmed that reestablishing commercial flights is their priority once the road has been re-opened.

- The Ministry is still seeking confirmation of the availability of transport providers to support movement of people from hotels to airports. This will likely be needed either for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.

These include suburbs that must be passed through in order to reach the airport. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.

# New Zealand's response

- Welfare checks are being conducted by Post and Consular Call Centre staff to monitor particular individuals.
- New Zealand's current travel alert level for all of New Caledonia is **Avoid non-essential travel** (Level 3 of 4). This will have implications for travel insurance and our consular response.

We were told that Sunday is in fact the busiest day so far in the crisis for the French resupply and military deployments with near constant flights between Magenta and Tontouta international airport.
- There were serious clashes again overnight, particularly around Magenta. The Magenta airfield fell victim to rioters, and exchanges with military personnel were heard. The French Armed Forces have been tasked with securing the domestic Magenta airport and with establishing an airbridge between Tontouta and the domestic airport Magenta.
- Yesterday at 5pm local time, the military were attacked by rioters throwing hammers and stones. Security forces used tear gas and stun grenades in response. s6(a)
- Heightened tensions in Dumbéa and Païta (areas that need to be passed through to gain access to Tontouta airport). The main Tontouta airport will remain closed until at least 9am on Tuesday 21 May. The New Caledonian Government has confirmed that reestablishing commercial flights is their priority once the road has been re-opened.
- The route to the airport remains unpassable there are reportedly improvised explosive devices that have been placed using gas cannisters and nails. [Note this is why the airport remains closed]
- The Ministry is still seeking confirmation of the availability of transport providers to support movement of people from hotels to airports. This will likely be needed either for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. These notably include suburbs that must be passed through in order to reach the airport. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.

- The French High Commission has ordered that the 6pm to 6am curfew remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency (12 days from first declaration on 15 May). The curfew has been extended to cover the entire territory of New Caledonia (it previously only applied to the wider Noumea area).
- The death toll stands at 5, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Noumea harbour – the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
- Local residents in many suburbs (including those where MFAT seconded staff residences are located) are organising themselves into "militias" and have set up barricades on the roads and are controlling access into and out of the street (especially in the evenings/overnight). Many of these groups likely have guns [note: there are 76,000 registered/declared firearms in New Caledonia, for a population of 270,000 people.]

- New Caledonia Prime Minister Gabriel Attal has indicated that 17 house arrests of riot leaders have been requested. The judicial authorities are also hard at work. The public prosecutor reported that there were 4 criminal proceedings, 163 people in police custody, 26 people deferred to court, but also that an investigation had been opened "into acts of criminal conspiracy, theft, damage by fire in an organized gang, grouping with a view to committing violence or damage".
- Most food stores in the area are pretty much empty and shops in some outer suburbs which have been looted and burnt.

New Zealanders we met with today noted that there are supermarkets open in the Noumea area. We understand there will be a potential restock of the convenience store located within walking distance of the hotels where a large number of New Zealanders are staying.
- The French High Commission confirmed also that 47 containers of food arrived on a ship in Noumea harbour yesterday, a further 56 containers are expected to arrive today (these contain food and medications). Distribution and transport of the items to local shops remains unclear, particularly for the worst impacted areas.
- New Caledonia produces around 15% of its own food needs, the rest is imported. Almost none of this would be produced within the Noumea area, so there are likely to be internal distribution issues.
- There is concern about shortage of supplies in the hospital, including blood. A survey of available stocks of medicines and oxygen is currently underway. A stock of blood should arrive today by plane from France.
- The High Commissioner estimated that there were likely around 4,000 people actively involved in the riots in the greater Noumea area, most between 15 and 25 years old.
- Value of damages since the start of the civil unrest on Monday estimated at around XPF 24,000,000,000 (approx. NZD 357 million). According to economic players, between 150 and 180 businesses have been destroyed and 2,000 people have potentially lost their jobs.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- Erench Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favorable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred

thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."

- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes the mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- <u>French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc</u> said in a televised news conference
  the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He
  said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars
  and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."

Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

- New Zealand s6(b)(i) assisted departure flights proposed for today (Sunday 19 May) were not approved by the Noumea authorities on security grounds. We were told that Sunday is in fact the busiest day so far in the crisis for the French resupply and military deployments with near constant flights between Magenta and Tontouta international airport.
- Another person has been killed and two more injured in an exchange of gunfire on Saturday 18 May as they tried to pass a barricade near Kaala-Gomen. This brings the death toll to six, including two gendarmes and three Kanak.
- The Magenta airfield fell victim to rioters Friday night 17 May, and exchanges with military personnel were heard. The military were attacked by rioters throwing hammers and stones. Security forces used tear gas and stun grenades in response. The French Armed Forces have been tasked with securing the domestic Magenta airport. s6(a)
- Heightened tensions in Dumbéa and Païta (areas that need to be passed through to gain access to Tontouta airport). The main Tontouta airport will remain closed until at least 9am on Tuesday 21 May. The New Caledonian Government has confirmed that reestablishing commercial flights is their priority once the road has been re-opened.

- New Zealanders we met with on Saturday 18 May noted that there are supermarkets open in the Noumea area. We understand there will be a potential restock of the convenience store located within walking distance of the hotels where a large number of New Zealanders are staying.

#### In France

President Emmanuel Macron has invited Parties from New Caledonia to Paris to

- participate in dialogue. Some have indicated they would take up this invitation.
- The videoconference that Emmanuel Macron had proposed with various actors will not be able to take place at this time, as they "do not wish to dialogue with each other for the moment", the Elysée Palace announced. Instead, Macron will only engage "directly with the elected representatives".

# Consular response

- Officials have spoken to management at the Sheraton Deva in Bourail (around two hours northwest of Noumea). There is no rioting in the immediate vicinity and the hotel has good food stocks. We understand that New Zealanders staying at this hotel are comfortable.
- Ministry officials and an Air NZ sales representative (who is staying at the Chateau Royal) met with New Zealanders at the Hilton hotel on Saturday 18 May to discuss updates and answer questions.
- New Zealanders in New Caledonia should stay in place and avoid all protests, monitor local media for developments, and comply with any instructions and restrictions issued by local authorities.
- Welfare checks are being conducted by Post and Consular Call Centre staff to monitor particular individuals.
- New Zealand's current travel alert level for all of New Caledonia is **Avoid non-essential travel** (Level 3 of 4). This will have implications for travel insurance and our consular response.

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- The route to the airport remains unpassable there are reportedly improvised explosive devices that have been placed using gas cannisters and nails. [Note this is why the airport remains closed]
- The Ministry is still seeking confirmation of the availability of transport providers to support movement of people from hotels to airports. This will likely be needed either for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. These notably include suburbs that must be passed through in order to reach the airport. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.

- The French High Commission has ordered that the 6pm to 6am curfew remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency (12 days from first declaration on 15 May). The curfew has been extended to cover the entire territory of New Caledonia (it previously only applied to the wider Noumea area).
- Local residents in many suburbs (including those where MFAT seconded staff residences are located) are organising themselves into "militias" and have set up barricades on the roads and are controlling access into and out of the street (especially in the evenings/overnight). Many of these groups likely have guns [note: there are 76,000 registered/declared firearms in New Caledonia, for a population of 270,000 people.]
- New Caledonia Prime Minister Gabriel Attal has indicated that 17 house arrests of riot leaders have been requested. The judicial authorities are also hard at work. The public prosecutor reported that there were 4 criminal proceedings, 163 people in police custody, 26 people deferred to court, but also that an investigation had been opened "into acts of criminal conspiracy, theft, damage by fire in an organized gang, grouping with a view to committing violence or damage".
- Most food stores in the area are pretty much empty and shops in some outer suburbs which have been looted and burnt.

- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by systematically removing barrages and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- New Zealanders we met with today noted that there are supermarkets open in the Noumea area. We understand there will be a potential restock of the convenience store located within walking distance of the hotels where a large number of New Zealanders are staying.
- New Caledonia produces around 15% of its own food needs, the rest is imported. Almost none of this would be produced within the Noumea area, so there are likely to be internal distribution issues.
- There is concern about shortage of supplies in the hospital, including blood. A survey of available stocks of medicines and oxygen is currently underway. A stock of blood was due to arrive Saturday 18 May by plane from France.
- The High Commissioner estimated that there were likely around 4,000 people actively involved in the riots in the greater Noumea area, most between 15 and 25 years old.
- Value of damages since the start of the civil unrest on Monday estimated at around XPF 24,000,000,000 (approx. NZD 357 million). According to economic players, between 150 and 180 businesses have been destroyed and 2,000 people have potentially lost their jobs.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- <u>French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal</u>, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favorable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he

continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."

- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes the mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to

- take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."

This brings the death toll to six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Noumea harbour the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an

inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.

- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government

make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."

- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

In parallel, the Ministry continues to work on an assisted departure led by NZDF, which is contingent on approval by French authorities. Post in Noumea has been advised by the French High Commission that if French Ministers agree to the proposal on the trilateral call, then the NZDF assisted departure flight can go ahead. The C-130 can carry up to 46 passengers and NZDF flights require 12 hours' notice before departing. Officials are standing ready to organise this flight quickly should France agree and align with Australia's

Ministers Peters and Wong have sent a letter to the French Ministers of Foreign Affairs and the Interior ahead of the trilateral call via the French Embassy in Wellington. The letter urges the French Government to urgently facilitate assisted departure flights for New Zealanders, Australians and other nationals out of New Caledonia.

Preparations are under way for a trilateral phone call between Minister Peters and the Foreign Ministers of France and Australia. This is expected to take place at 7:30pm this evening NZT. Should the French Ministers agree to an assisted departure, officials will move quickly to arrange a flight for Tuesday 21 May.

#### In Noumea

- One person has been killed and two more injured in an exchange of gunfire on Saturday 18 May as they tried to pass a barricade near Kaala-Gomen. This brings the death toll to six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Noumea harbour the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
- The French High Commissioner statement last night included that "Republican order here will be re-established whatever the cost". He said that the authorities had regained control of the road between Noumea and the International Airport. Around 60 roadblocks had been dismantled, but the clean-up and repair operation would last several days. Due to this, the authorities assess that the road will not be useable until the weekend (i.e. Saturday 25 May) at the earliest.
- The High Commissioner also called on those with weapons to hand them in and warned of the potential consequences should they be used against trained French security forces.
- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Revised damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.
- The Ministry is still seeking confirmation of the availability of transport providers to support movement of people from hotels to airports. This will likely be needed for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by
  police forces who are generally the target of the violence. A "demining" exercise would
  need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.
- The 6pm to 6am curfew will remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency. This curfew covers the entire territory of New Caledonia. The local government has announced that schools will be closed next week.
- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials confirmed this morning that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items. 20 shops have reopened and the New Caledonian Government have said many of the shops will be restocked Monday 20 May.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a) returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview this morning, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of

calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- <u>Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown</u> [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries

value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."

- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister. Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

## Media comments by other Leaders

In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for

appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."

"Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."

- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. This is being organised by Peace Action Wellington via social media, rallied by pro-Palestine groups and is intended to be in solidarity with the Kanak people in New Caledonia. A police presence is being organised for additional security around the Embassy. MFAT is in touch with police and French officials.

## Media comments by other Leaders

- President Emmanuel Macron "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a)

board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
  - <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.

- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- <u>French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc</u> said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and

limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."

• <u>Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni</u> said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

- President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home". French officials have advised they wish to start moving foreign nationals out of New Caledonia yesterday (Tuesday 21 May).
- The French High Commissioner statement last night included that "Republican order here

will be re-established whatever the cost". He said that the authorities had regained control of the road between Noumea and the International Airport. Around 60 roadblocks had been dismantled, but the clean-up and repair operation would last several days. Due to this, the authorities assess that the road will not be useable until the weekend (i.e. Saturday 25 May) at the earliest.

- The High Commissioner also called on those with weapons to hand them in and warned of the potential consequences should they be used against trained French security forces.
- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Revised damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.
- The Ministry has organised transportation to support movement of people from hotels to airports. s6(a)
   This will likely be needed for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.
- The 6pm to 6am curfew will remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency. This curfew covers the entire territory of New Caledonia. The local government has announced that schools will be closed next week.
- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.
- 20 shops have reopened and the New Caledonian Government have said many of the shops will be restocked Monday 20 May.

## New Zealand's response

- Minister Peters put out a press release announcing the assisted departure flight, and also posted on twifter/X, "We were pleased 48 NZers arrived back from New Caledonia on a NZ Government plane into Auckland last night. We are working with France & Australia on a further flight today to bring another group of Kiwis in New Caledonia home via Brisbane, using Erench & NZ aircraft.
- 48 New Zealanders were repatriated to Auckland via the NZDF C-130 flight yesterday (Tuesday 21 May). Officials continue to work with French authorities regarding subsequent flights.
- A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer has been deployed to Noumea on the first repatriation flight and will remain in country to manage immigration screening requirements across the duration of the response.

A police presence is being organised for additional security around the Embassy. MFAT is in touch with police and French officials.

Since the unrest erupted, Ministry officials have met with over 100 Kiwis at hotels to discuss updates and answer questions. # Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Emmanuel Macron</u> "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a) returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
  - French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of

calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- <u>Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown</u> [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries

value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."

- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister. Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

# Key media messages

- New Zealand is seriously concerned about the situation and violent protests in Noumea.
- The safety of New Zealanders in New Caledonia is an urgent priority for us. We are aware of around 225 New Zealanders remaining in New Caledonia that wish to depart.
- A French-operated flight is bringing 49 stranded travellers to Brisbane tonight, with an NZDF flight arranged for the onward travel from Brisbane to New Zealand.
- The French flight departed Tontouta Airport a short time ago (Wednesday 22 May). The flight from Brisbane to Auckland is due to arrive at Auckland International Airport around 1:30 am NZ time (Thursday 23 May).
- MFAT is working with French and Australian authorities on logistics.
- A New Zealand Defence Force (NZDF) C-130 arrived back in New Zealand around 10.00pm last night (Tuesday 21 May), bringing 48 passengers back to New Zealand who had been stranded in New Caledonia since violent protests erupted there last week.
- Yesterday's flight carried 48 passengers with the most pressing needs from Nouméa to Auckland.
- New Zealand consular staff in Noumea will continue to prioritise passengers for flights on a needs basis.
- Logistical arrangements for today's flight and subsequent flights are still being worked through by MFAT and NZDF staff.
- We are working hard with France and Australia to ensure that further assisted departure flights can operate in the coming days.
- We have asked those registered with us on SafeTravel to let us know if they wish to express their interest in any potential further flight options, following the first flight out yesterday.
- [If asked about the specifics of the potential NZDF deployment]: We are not able to share details on specifics at this stage.

- French Authorities granted approval for a NZDF plane to repatriate travellers to New Zealand yesterday (Tuesday 21 May). This flight repatriated 48 people back to Auckland late last night. - The French are operating their own assisted departure flights on MRTT aircraft. They assess that they can move 200 people per flight, taking them to Brisbane (a mixture of nationalities). The first French operated assisted departure flight departed Noumea this evening (Wednesday 22 May). A NZDF 757 is en route to Brisbane to meet the French aircraft and return passengers to New Zealand.

  The flight on Friday 24 May is still scheduled to go ahead.
- MFAT consular staff facilitated 49 passengers on today's flight out of Noumea (Wednesday 22 May) with the operation to transfer them to New Zealand via an NZDF flight is currently under way. NZDF is deploying an asset to Brisbane to meet the French flight and bring the New Zealand passengers directly to Auckland International Airport, with anticipated arrival time approximately 1.30am on Thursday 23 May.
- MBIE Temporary Accommodation Service stand ready to provide support to any of the travellers arriving on tomorrow morning's early flight, on a needs only basis if they do not already have accommodation arranged in Auckland.

• A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer from MBIE travelled up to Noumea on yesterday's flight and will remain in-country to manage immigration screening throughout the duration of the response. #### In Noumea

- The death toll from the unrest currently sits at six people.

Latest reporting suggests he will arrive on Thursday morning, accompanied by the French Minister for the Interior [Darmanin] and Overseas and French Defence Minister [Lecornu].
- President Macron convened a third national security and defence council meeting in the early hours of Tuesday 21 May NZ time. The council announced that Tontouta Airport will remain closed to commercial flights until Thursday 23 May with more military personnel brought in to protect government buildings.
- President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home". French officials advised they wished to start moving foreign nationals out of New Caledonia yesterday (Tuesday 21 May).
- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.

### New Zealand's response

- The Minister of Foreign Affairs this afternoon (22 May 2024) held bilateral calls with the Prime Ministers of Tonga and Fiji this evening, as members of the Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) Troika, to discuss the evolving situation in New Caledonia. MFA shared an update on Twitter/X of these calls.
- Minister Peters shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia yesterday and urging all New Zealanders in Noumea to register on SafeTravel.
- Minister Peters put out a <u>press release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight, and also <u>posted on twitter/X</u>, "We were pleased 48 NZers arrived back from New Caledonia on a <u>NZ Government plane into Auckland last night. We are working with France & Australia on a further flight today to bring another group of Kiwis in New Caledonia home via Brisbane, <u>using French & NZ aircraft."</u></u>
- Minister Peters also spoke with <u>Checkpoint</u> and <u>Newstalk ZB</u> Tuesday 21 May.
- A planned protest took place in front of the French Embassy in Wellington from 12pm 1:30pm Wednesday 22 May, in support of Kanak people in New Caledonia. Around 50 people took part in the peaceful protest, which included around 10 speeches, "Kanaky resistance" songs and chants in Te Reo Māori. New Zealand Police deployed four officers to monitor the protest and ensure the security of the Embassy. New Zealand media were present at the protest (RNZ).

We acknowledge that the political and economic situation in New Caledonia is challenging and reiterate calls on all Parties to find a solution. We hope that peace and calm will prevail.
- The immediate priority must be for all sides to take steps to de-escalate the situation, so that there can be dialogue and calm. No matter your views on the political arrangements in New Caledonia, everyone should agree that violence is harmful to every community there.
- [If raised: PIF Members and Secretariat comments on crisis] The Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) is the region's pre-eminent political entity and it is understandable that Forum Members and the PIF Secretariat are following developments in New Caledonia closely. We recognise and share the concern felt among Forum Members at the recent violence. We engage in a consistent manner with all Forum Members, including New Caledonia, on PIF matters and put high value on the centrality and unity of the PIF. - MFAT consular staff facilitated 49 passengers on today's flight out of Noumea (Wednesday 22 May) with the operation to transfer them to New Zealand via an NZDF flight is currently under way. NZDF is deploying an asset to Brisbane to meet the French flight and bring the New Zealand passengers directly to Auckland International Airport, with anticipated arrival time approximately 1.30am on Thursday 23 May.
- MBIE Temporary Accommodation Service stand ready to provide support to any of the travellers arriving on tomorrow morning's early flight, on a needs only basis if they do not already have accommodation arranged in Auckland.

- A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer from MBIE has travelled up to Noumea on yesterday's flight and will remain in-country to manage immigration screening throughout the duration of the response. There are also ten NZDF logistical support staff now in Noumea working with the New Zealand Consulate General and deployed MFAT Consular arrangements for assisted departures.
- Following the trilateral call with Minister Peters and the Foreign Ministers of France and Australia on Monday 20 May, both <u>MFA</u> and <u>Senator Wong</u> posted on twitter/X reiterating the request for access for repatriation flights.

## In Noumea

- One person has been killed and two more injured in an exchange of gunfire on Saturday 18 May as they tried to pass a barricade near Kaala-Gomen. This brings the death toll to six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Noumea harbour the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
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- President Macron convened a third national security and defence council meeting in the early hours this morning (Tuesday 21 May NZ time). The council announced that Tontouta Airport will remain closed until Thursday 23 May and more military personnel will be sent in to protect government buildings.
  - President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home". French officials have advised they wish to start moving foreign nationals out of New Caledonia yesterday (Tuesday 21 May).
- The French High Commissioner statement last night included that "Republican order here will be re-established whatever the cost". He said that the authorities had regained control of the road between Noumea and the International Airport. Around 60 roadblocks had been dismantled, but the clean-up and repair operation would last several days. Due to this, the authorities assess that the road will not be useable until the weekend (i.e. Saturday 25 May) at the earliest.
- The High Commissioner also called on those with weapons to hand them in and warned of

the potential consequences should they be used against trained French security forces.

- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Revised damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.
- The Ministry has organised transportation to support movement of people from hotels to airports. s6(a)
   This will likely be needed for assisted departure flights or when commercial options reopen.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed.
- The 6pm to 6am curfew will remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency. This curfew covers the entire territory of New Caledonia. The local government has announced that schools will be closed next week.
- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.
- 20 shops have reopened and the New Caledonian Government have said many of the shops will be restocked Monday 20 May.

#### New Zealand's response

- The Minister of Foreign Affairs this afternoon (22 May 2024) held bilateral calls with the Prime Ministers of Tonga and Fiji this evening, as members of the Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) Troika, to discuss the evolving situation in New Caledonia. MFA shared an update on Twitter/X of these calls.
- Minister Peters shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia yesterday and urging all New Zealanders in Noumea to register on SafeTravel.
- Minister Peters put out a <u>press release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight, and also <u>posted on twitter/X</u>. "We were pleased 48 NZers arrived back from New Caledonia on a <u>NZ Government plane into Auckland last night. We are working with France & Australia on a further flight today to bring another group of Kiwis in New Caledonia home via Brisbane, <u>using French & NZ aircraft</u>.</u>
- 48 New Zealanders were repatriated to Auckland via the NZDF C-130 flight yesterday (Tuesday 21 May). Officials continue to work with French authorities regarding subsequent flights.
- A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer has been deployed to Noumea on the first repatriation flight and will remain in country to manage immigration screening requirements across the duration of the response.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>President Emmanuel Macron</u> "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf. returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of

calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- <u>Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown</u> [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries

value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."

- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister. Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

- New Zealand's current travel alert level for all of New Caledonia is Avoid non-essential travel (Level 3 of 4). This will have implications for travel insurance and our consular response.

- We recommend that all travellers remain in contact with their airline for any updates on flight bookings. Travellers should also contact their travel insurance provider if travel has been disrupted.
- [If asked why the NZ Consulate in Noumea is closed] Due to the State of Emergency in New Caledonia, and the security requirement to stay home/in place, New Zealand Consulate staff are working remotely. Callers to the Consulate are being directed to New Zealand's 24/7 Consular Emergency line.

- Minister Peters put out a <u>press release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight, and also posted on <u>twitter/X</u>. Minister Peters also spoke with <u>Checkpoint</u> and <u>Newstalk ZB</u> yesterday evening [Tuesday 21 May].
- A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer from MBIE will remain in-country to manage immigration screening throughout the duration of the response. There are also ten NZDF logistical support staff now in Noumea working with the New Zealand Consulate General and deployed MFAT Consular team on arrangements for assisted departures.
- In parallel to the New Zealand assisted departure flights, the French approved the assisted departure of Australian nationals via two Australian C-130 flights from Magenta on Tuesday 21 May. <u>Australia's Senator Wong</u> also posted to confirm the Australian flights. Australia's Senator Wong has posted on <u>Twitter/X</u> to confirm work with French authorities for further flights.

- There are some <u>reports</u> of protesters erecting new barricades overnight in what was
  described as a 'cat and mouse' game with French police reinforcements ahead of
  President Macron's arrival. <u>Journalists</u> have highlighted that the composition of President
  Macron's delegation could further anger pro-independence leader and fuel further unrest.
- One person has been killed and two more injured in an exchange of gunfire on Saturday 18 May as they tried to pass a barricade near Kaala-Gomen. This brings the death toll to six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Noumea harbour the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
- French President Emmanuel Macron has arrived in New Caledonia, accompanied by the French Minister for the Interior [Darmanin] and Overseas, the French Defence Minister [Lecornu], and the Minister Delegate for Overseas France [Guévenoux]. While in Noumea, the President intends to meet with local representatives to discuss the evolving situation.
- President Macron convened a third national security and defence council meeting in the early hours of Tuesday 21 May NZ time. The council announced that Tontouta Airport will remain closed to commercial flights until Thursday 23 May with more military personnel brought in to protect government buildings. We have not received any further update on this, but are proceeding on the basis that commercial flights will not resume today.
- President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home". French officials have advised they wish to start moving foreign nationals out of New Caledonia yesterday (Tuesday 21 May).
- The French High Commissioner's statement on Tuesday included that "Republican order here will be re-established whatever the cost". He said that the authorities had regained control of the road between Noumea and the International Airport. Around 60 roadblocks had been dismantled, but the clean-up and repair operation would last several days. Due to this, the authorities assess that the road will not be useable until the weekend (i.e. Saturday 25 May) at the earliest.
- The High Commissioner also called on those with weapons to hand them in and warned of the potential consequences should they be used against trained French security forces.
- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Revised damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.
- There are still outer suburbs of Noumea that remain largely inaccessible, including by police forces who are generally the target of the violence. A "demining" exercise would need to be carried out before the safety of the roads could be guaranteed. The Ministry, working with French authorities, has organised transportation to support the safe movement of people from hotels to airports for assisted departures.
- The 6pm to 6am curfew will remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency. This curfew covers the entire territory of New Caledonia. The local government has announced that schools will be closed next week.
- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.

• 20 shops have reopened and the New Caledonian Government have said many of the shops will be restocked Monday 20 May.

### New Zealand's response

- The Minister spoke with Pacific Islands Forum Chair Prime Minister Mark Brown at 3:30pm Saturday 18 May. The discussion included New Zealand's desire to work with Pacific partners to help calm the situation down, and the role of the PIF to facilitate dialogue and promote de-escalation in the region. Officials are also exploring calls for MFA with the Prime Ministers of Fiji and Tonga.
- Officials continue to work closely with Australia to ensure our responses are callibrated.
   Minister Peters held a trilateral call with the Foreign Ministers of France and Australia on Monday 20 May, reiterating the request for access for repatriation flights.

- Following the announcement of the first repatriation flight Minister Peters put out a <u>press</u> release announcing the assisted departure flight, and also <u>posted on twitter/X</u>. He also shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia yesterday and urging all New Zealanders in Noumea to register on SafeTravel.
- A planned protest took place in front of the French Embassy in Wellington from 12pm 1:30pm Wednesday 22 May. Around 50 people took part in the peaceful protest, and included around 10 speeches, "Kanaky resistance" songs and chants in Te Reo Māori. Journalists from RNZ were present. In addition to French security, 3 local police officers were deployed and a liaison office to supervise the demonstration. The protestors warned there might be "other actions" but did not expand on what these might be.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- <u>Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown</u> noted on RNZ Morning Report this morning [Thursday 23 May] the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Island] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview <u>here</u>.
- President Emmanuel Macron "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a)
  returned to New Caledonia last night on
  board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled
  the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for
  the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the
  electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean
  that their actions had been successful.

- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- Erench Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political pro-independence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group'

or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."

- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown [and outgoing PIF Chair] said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Noumea Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Noumea were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- <u>Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni</u> said the growing unrest was a concern. At

last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

- [If asked about French approvals to fly today]: Unfortunately, we have not received approvals from France for any flights today. We appreciate this will be frustrating for New Zealanders waiting to come home.
- [If asked about potential flights for tomorrow]: There was no French-operated flight today, but we are working hard with France and Australia on potential flights for tomorrow.
- [If asked about individual cases in the media]: We are unable to comment on individual cases, but we are hopeful that all passengers with prioritised needs who can safely travel to pick-up points will be able to depart on the next available flights.
- [If asked about other foreign nationals on NZDF flight]: A small number of seats were also offered to other nationals with urgent needs.
- [If asked about transport on the ground/road access to airports, etc.]: We continue to work with relevant authorities on the ground to understand security and access issues, including for travel to airports in Nouméa.
- [If raised: independence of New Caledonia] The question of independence is one for the people of New Caledonia to decide with France. We acknowledge that the political and economic situation in New Caledonia is challenging and reiterate calls on all Parties to find a solution. We hope that peace and calm will prevail.
- must be for all sides to take steps to de-escalate the situation, so that there can be dialogue and calm. No matter your views on the political arrangements in New Caledonia, everyone should agree that violence is harmful to every community there.
- [If raised: PIF comments on crisis] We recognise and share the concern felt among Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) members at the recent violence. It is for individual countries to make their own assessments on the situation in New Caledonia. New Zealand has been very clear on the need for all sides to take steps to de-escalate, so that there can be dialogue and calm.

- New Zealanders are urged to keep their SafeTravel Registration up to date, in particular, ensuring that their 'departure date' is updated.

- New Zealanders in New Caledonia should stay in place and avoid all protests, monitor local media for developments, and comply with any instructions and restrictions issued by local authorities.
- Our staff in Wellington and Nouméa continue to conduct welfare checks on New Zealanders in New Caledonia.
- Officials are regularly speaking with New Caledonian authorities regarding airport operations and access, and ongoing needs in relation to critical supplies such as food and medicine.
- New Zealand's current travel advisory for all of New Caledonia is Avoid non-essential travel (Level 3 of 4). This will have implications for travel insurance and our consular response.
- We recommend that all travellers remain in contact with their airline for any updates on flight bookings. Travellers should also contact their travel insurance provider if travel has been disrupted.
- [If asked why the NZ Consulate in Nouméa is closed] Due to the State of Emergency in New Caledonia, New Zealand Consulate staff are working remotely. Callers to the Consulate are being directed to New Zealand's 24/7 Consular Emergency line.

This would include: 1) a NZDF-operated C-130 daytime departure from Magenta airport on Friday afternoon, travelling direct to Auckland; and 2) a French-operated MRTT early Saturday morning departure from Tontouta Airport to Brisbane, which would be met by an NZDF 757 for onwards transport to Auckland. Passengers on the flight to Brisbane would likely be transported to Tontouta airport by shuttle flights between Magenta and Tontouta.

One key consideration is the ability of Auckland Airport to replicate refuelling services provided at Brisbane Airport, for which we have in-principle agreement from Auckland Airport.

- We are also exploring further NZDF C-130 flights on both Saturday 25 and Sunday 26 May,

subject to French approvals. Both flights would travel between Magenta and Auckland International Airport, and be able to carry up to 50 passengers.

- A further 50 people were repatriated back to Auckland in the early hours of this morning.
   A French military aircraft transported them from Nouméa to Brisbane, where they were met by a NZDF aircraft, which returned them to Auckland. 48 passengers were repatriated on Tuesday's NZDF-operated flight out of Nouméa direct to Auckland.

- MBIE Temporary Accommodation Service provided accommodation support overnight to a family of five who arrived on this morning's early flight, as they did not already have accommodation arranged in Auckland. The MFAT consular team on the flight from Brisbane to Auckland managed down the number requiring MBIE temporary accommodation support from 12 passengers to five passengers.
- This morning (Thursday 23 May), the Minister of Foreign Affairs posted on <u>Twitter/X</u> expressing frustration at the lack of approval for flights today. This post has been reported by <u>NZ media</u>.
- Minister Peters put out a <u>press release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight on Tuesday 21 May, and also <u>posted on Twitter/X</u>. He shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia on Tuesday's assisted departure flight. Minister Peters also spoke with <u>Checkpoint</u> and <u>Newstalk ZB</u> on Tuesday 21 May following the flight leaving Nouméa.
- A New Zealand Immigration Liaison Officer from MBIE will remain in-country to manage immigration screening throughout the duration of the response. There are also ten NZDF logistical support staff now in Nouméa working with the New Zealand Consulate General and deployed MFAT Consular team on arrangements for assisted departures.
- In parallel to the New Zealand assisted departure flights, the French approved the assisted departure of Australian nationals via two Australian C-130 flights from Magenta on Tuesday 21 May. Australia's Senator Wong also posted to confirm the Australian flights. Australia's Senator Wong has posted on <a href="Twitter/X">Twitter/X</a> to confirm work with French authorities for further flights.

## In Nouméa

- There are some <u>reports</u> of protesters erecting new barricades last night in what was described as a 'cat and mouse' game with French police reinforcements ahead of President Macron's arrival. <u>Journalists</u> have highlighted that the composition of President Macron's delegation could further anger pro-independence leader and fuel further unrest.
- One person has been killed and two more injured in an exchange of gunfire on Saturday 18 May as they tried to pass a barricade near Kaala-Gomen. This brings the death toll to six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Nouméa harbour – the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
- We have received indications <sup>s6(a)</sup> La Tontouta Airport may reopen for commercial flights from Saturday or Sunday, but it is too early to tell if this timeframe will play out in practice. We understand that Aircalin has been asked to assist with repatriation flights. They have scheduled flights between New Zealand and New Caledonia on Saturday and Sunday.

- French President Emmanuel Macron touched down in Nouméa at around 8,30am local time this morning, accompanied by Minister of the Interior Gérald Darmanin, Associate Minister of Overseas Territories Marie Guévenoux, and Minister for the Armed Forces Sébastien Lecornu.
- Exact details of the President's programme are not known, but he has met with New Caledonian elected officials this morning and is expected to meet with representatives of the business community as well, given the significant economic impact of the civil unrest.
- The Minister of the Interior and the Minister of the Armed Forces will meet with the internal security forces. The Associate Minister for Overseas Territories will hold a specific meeting on reconstruction.
- President Macron has insisted on the need for "frank, direct, open debate on institutional and project issues". He said: "We need to bring all stakeholders to the table. Appearement cannot mean going backwards. The objective is to have a free and confidential debate between us. I'm counting on everyone's sense of responsibility. We will succeed, because New Caledonia deserves it". Macron hinted that the emergency status could be lifted in e of E of Filicial Index the official Index the the coming days, saying: "I personally believe that the state of emergency should not be extended."

- President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home."
- The French High Commissioner's statement on Tuesday included that "Republican order here will be re-established whatever the cost". He said that the authorities had regained control of the road between Nouméa and the International Airport. Around 60 roadblocks had been dismantled, but the clean-up and repair operation would last several days. Due to this, the authorities assess that the road will not be useable until the weekend (i.e. Saturday 25 May) at the earliest.

- The High Commissioner also called on those with weapons to hand them in and warned of the potential consequences should they be used against trained French security forces.
- While the situation appears to be stabilising, violence and clashes with security forces continue. Revised damage assessments estimate the cost at around XPF 40 billion (approximately NZ\$590 million). An estimated 2,000 jobs have also been impacted.
- The 6pm to 6am curfew will remain in force for the full duration of the state of emergency. This curfew covers the entire territory of New Caledonia. The local government has announced that schools will be closed next week.
- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.
- 20 shops have reopened and the New Caledonian Government have said many of the shops will be restocked Monday 20 May.

- The Minister of Foreign Affairs yesterday held bilateral calls with the Prime Ministers of Tonga and Fiji, as members of the Pacific Islands Forum Troika to discuss the evolving situation in New Caledonia. MFA shared an update on <a href="mailto:Twitter/X">Twitter/X</a> of these calls.
- The Minister spoke with Pacific Islands Forum Chair Prime Minister Mark Brown at 3:30pm Saturday 18 May. The discussion included New Zealand's desire to work with Pacific partners to help calm the situation down, and the role of the PIF to facilitate dialogue and promote de-escalation in the region.
- Officials continue to work closely with Australia to ensure our responses are lined up.
   Minister Peters held a trilateral call with the Foreign Ministers of France and Australia on Monday 20 May, reiterating the request for access for repatriation flights.
- Following the announcement of the first repatriation flight Minister Peters put out a <u>press</u> <u>release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight, and also <u>posted on twitter/X</u>. <u>He also</u> shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia and urging all New Zealanders in Nouméa to register on SafeTravel.
- A planned protest took place in front of the French Embassy in Wellington from 12pm –
   1:30pm Wednesday 22 May. Around 50 people took part in the peaceful protest, and included around 10 speeches, "Kanaky resistance" songs and chants in Te Reo Māori.
   Journalists from RNZ were present as well as some Members of Parliament. In addition to

French security, 3 local police officers were deployed and a liaison office to supervise the demonstration. The protestors warned there might be "other actions" but did not expand on what these might be.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- International media have started to report more on the situation in New Caledonia.
   Outlets <u>including BBC</u>, <u>CNN and Al Jazeera</u> have covered our first assisted departure flight, alongside Australia's own efforts.
- <u>Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown</u> noted on RNZ Morning Report this morning (Thursday 23 May) the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Islands] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview <a href="https://example.com/here/new/memoring-memoring-new/memoring
- President Emmanuel Macron "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his

convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).

- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a)
  returned to New Caledonia last night on
  board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled
  the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for
  the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the
  electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean
  that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.
- Erench Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French)

gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.

- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown (and outgoing PIF Chair said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- <u>French High Commissioner in Nouméa Louis Le Franc</u> said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Nouméa were blocked by barricades with burning cars

and car carcasses, some with booby traps.

- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- <u>Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni</u> said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already

Executive Summary SitRep 20: New Caledonia Unrest – Friday 24 May

# Key media messages

- New Zealand is deeply concerned about the political unrest in New Caledonia, and we call for calm and dialogue to prevail.
- The safety of New Zealanders in New Caledonia is an urgent priority for us.
- An NZDF flight has arrived in New Caledonia this morning. It is due to arrive in Auckland around 2:30pm with around 50 passengers on board.
- Following today's assisted departure, we are aware of around <u>160</u> New Zealanders remaining in New Caledonia who wish to depart.
- Today's flight will be the third government flight to arrive in New Zealand carrying travellers from New Caledonia. Seats on these flights were prioritised based on two considerations urgent needs and the ability for passengers to safely travel to central pick-up points in Nouméa.
- Our consular team, continues to work with Australia on moving New Zealanders in other parts of New Caledonia into Nouméa to be ready for departure home on the next flights out.
- Based on our current information, we are hopeful that all passengers with prioritised needs who can safely travel to pick-up points will be able to depart on the next available flights.
  - We have asked those registered on SafeTravel to let us know their interest in any potential further flight options.
- [If asked about potential NZDF flights over the weekend]: We are working hard with France and Australia on potential NZDF flights in coming days.
- [If asked about individual cases in the media]: We are unable to comment on individual cases, but we are hopeful that all passengers with prioritised needs who can safely travel to pick-up points will be able to depart on the next available flights.

#### Assisted Departures

- A NZDF C-130 flight departed Whenuapai for Magenta airport this morning just before 6am, and landed in Magenta airport just before 10am NZT s6(a)
- On its return flight, the C-130 is expected to carry around 50 passengers, and arrive at Auckland International Airport at around 2.30pm today. In addition to New Zealanders, this flight will include s6(a)
- s6(a) French officials advised us that the planned French MRTT flight Noumea to Brisbane would not go ahead. The MRTT flight was scheduled to depart Noumea at 1.00am on Saturday local time, carrying approximately 100 New Zealand passengers as well as a similar number of Australian passengers. s6(a)
- Pending French clearances, current NZDF planning for this weekend involves
  - o Saturday 25 May: C-130 transports <sup>s6(a)</sup> French nationals to New Caledonia, and returns 50-55 New Zealanders to Auckland.
  - o Sunday 26 May: C-130 transports s6(a) French nationals from Auckland to New Caledonia. The C-130 then does two trips from Noumea to Port Vila, Vanuatu transporting up to 60 passengers each time. These passengers (up to 120) will then be transported to Auckland by NZDF 757. This operation should be able to transport all remaining New Zealanders in New Caledonia back to New Zealand. We are exploring whether the 757 could support the repatriation of Vanuatu RSE workers from Auckland to Port Vila. A number of workers have not been able to return home to Vanuatu since Air Vanuatu entered liquidation.

#### In Nouméa

- The Minister of Foreign Affairs held bilateral calls with the Prime Ministers of Tonga and Fiji on Wednesday 22 May, as members of the Pacific Islands Forum Troika, to discuss the evolving situation in New Caledonia. MFA shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> of these calls.
- Minister Peters put out a <u>press release</u> announcing the assisted departure flight, and also <u>posted on Twitter/X</u>. He shared an update on <u>Twitter/X</u> with pictures of those leaving New Caledonia on Tuesday's assisted departure flight. Minister Peters also spoke with <u>Checkpoint</u> and <u>Newstalk ZB</u> on Tuesday 21 May following the flight leaving Nouméa.
- A planned protest took place in front of the French Embassy in Wellington from 12pm 1:30pm Wednesday 22 May, in support of Kanak people in New Caledonia. Around 50 people took part in the peaceful protest, which included around 10 speeches, "Kanaky resistance" songs and chants in Te Reo Māori. New Zealand Police deployed officers to monitor the protest and ensure the security of the Embassy. New Zealand media were present at the protest (RNZ).

- [If asked about potential NZDF flights over the weekend]: We are working hard with France and Australia on potential NZDF flights in the coming days.
- [If asked about French-operated flights] There will be no French-operated flight today, but we are working hard with France and Australia on potential flights in the coming days.
- [If asked about individual cases in the media]: We are unable to comment on individual cases, but we are hopeful that all passengers with prioritised needs who can safely travel to pick-up points will be able to depart on the next available flights.
- [If asked about other foreign nationals on NZDF flights]: A small number of seats were also offered to other nationals with urgent needs.
- [If asked about transport on the ground/road access to airports, etc.]: We continue to work with relevant authorities on the ground to understand security and access issues, including for travel to airports in Nouméa.
- [If raised: independence of New Caledonia] The question of independence is one for the people of New Caledonia to decide with France. We acknowledge that the political and economic situation in New Caledonia is challenging and reiterate calls on all Parties to find a solution. We hope that peace and calm will prevail.
- must be for all sides to take steps to de-escalate the situation, so that there can be dialogue and calm. No matter your views on the political arrangements in New Caledonia, everyone should agree that violence is harmful to every community there.
- [If raised: PIF comments on crisis] We recognise and share the concern felt among Pacific Islands Forum (PIF) members at the recent violence. It is for individual countries to make their own assessments on the situation in New Caledonia. # In Nouméa

- We have received indications from the French that La Tontouta Airport may reopen for commercial flights from Saturday or Sunday, but it is too early to tell if this timeframe will play out in practice. We understand that Aircalin has been asked to assist with repatriation flights. They have scheduled flights between New Zealand and New Caledonia on Saturday

and Sunday.

- French President Emmanuel Macron touched down in Nouméa at around 8.30am local time yesterday morning, accompanied by Minister of the Interior Gérald Darmanin, Associate Minister of Overseas Territories Marie Guévenoux, and Minister for the Armed Forces Sébastien Lecornu.
- Exact details of the President's programme are not known, but he met with New Caledonian elected officials yesterday and is expected to meet with representatives of the business community as well, given the significant economic impact of the civil unrest.
- The Minister of the Interior and the Minister of the Armed Forces will meet with the internal security forces. The Associate Minister for Overseas Territories will hold a specific meeting on reconstruction.
- President Macron has insisted on the need for "frank, direct, open debate on institutional and project issues". He said: "We need to bring all stakeholders to the table. Appeasement cannot mean going backwards. The objective is to have a free and confidential debate between us. I'm counting on everyone's sense of responsibility. We will succeed, because New Caledonia deserves it". Macron hinted that the emergency status could be lifted in the coming days, saying: "I personally believe that the state of emergency should not be extended."
- Reactions from local New Caledonia political figures are mixed. s6(a)

  Leading pro-France politician Sonia Backès said the visit was a strong sign of the President's personal commitment to the situation in New Caledonia.
- In the pro-independence camp, current President of the Congress Roch Wamytan called the visit "a show", noting that "the country is on fire and the President of the Republic shows up with two Ministers that we have had problems with in the past". He added that the only thing they wanted from Macron was a response to their request for the Bill proposing changes to the New Caledonian electoral roll be withdrawn.

- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.
- French officials confirmed last night that New Caledonia has sufficient provisions of food and medicine, including additional supplies that have arrived in the port. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.

- A planned protest took place in front of the French Embassy in Wellington from 12pm -1:30pm Wednesday 22 May. Around 50 people took part in the peaceful protest, and included around 10 speeches, "Kanaky resistance" songs and chants in Te Reo Māori. Journalists from RNZ were present as well as some Members of Parliament. In addition to French security, 3 local police officers were deployed and a liaison office to supervise the demonstration. The protestors warned there might be "other actions" but did not expand on what these might be.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- International media have started to report more on the situation in New Caledonia. Outlets <u>including BBC</u>, <u>CNN and Al Jazeera</u> have covered our first assisted departure flight, alongside Australia's own efforts.
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown noted on RNZ Morning Report yesterday (Thursday 23 May) the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Islands] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview here.
- President Emmanuel Macron "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
  - New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf. returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.

- French Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very

disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."

- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown (and outgoing PIF Chair said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- French High Commissioner in Nouméa Louis Le Franc said in a televised news conference the protesters were causing a "dire situation" for medicine and food for the population. He said main and secondary roads in Nouméa were blocked by barricades with burning cars and car carcasses, some with booby traps.
  - Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- <u>Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni</u> said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

# In Nouméa

- There are some <u>reports</u> of protesters erecting new barricades last night in what was described as a 'cat and mouse' game with French police reinforcements ahead of President Macron's arrival. <u>Journalists</u> have highlighted that the composition of President Macron's delegation could further anger pro-independence leader and fuel further unrest.
- The death toll stands at six, including 2 gendarmes and 3 Kanak. A body was also found in Nouméa harbour the circumstances of this death are not yet clear and may be unrelated.
- We have been informed that La Tontouta Airport, New Caledonia's international airport, will remain closed until Tuesday 28 May.
- French President Emmanuel Macron touched down in Nouméa at around 8.30am local

time yesterday morning, accompanied by Minister of the Interior Gérald Darmanin, Associate Minister of Overseas Territories Marie Guévenoux, and Minister for the Armed Forces Sébastien Lecornu.

- Exact details of the President's programme are not known, but he met with New Caledonian elected officials yesterday and is expected to meet with representatives of the business community as well, given the significant economic impact of the civil unrest.
- The Minister of the Interior and the Minister of the Armed Forces will meet with the internal security forces. The Associate Minister for Overseas Territories will hold a specific meeting on reconstruction.
- President Macron has insisted on the need for "frank, direct, open debate on institutional and project issues". He said: "We need to bring all stakeholders to the table. Appeasement cannot mean going backwards. The objective is to have a free and confidential debate between us. I'm counting on everyone's sense of responsibility. We will succeed, because New Caledonia deserves it". Macron hinted that the emergency status could be lifted in the coming days, saying: "I personally believe that the state of emergency should not be extended."
- President Macron noted clear progress in restoring order and that "All measures are being taken to enable tourists still present in the archipelago to return home."

# Media comments by other Leaders

- International media have started to report more on the situation in New Caledonia.

  Outlets <u>including BBC</u>, <u>CNN and Al Jazeera</u> have covered our first assisted departure flight, alongside Australia's own efforts.
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown noted on RNZ Morning Report yesterday (Thursday 23 May) the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Islands] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview here.
- <u>President Emmanuel Macron</u> "noted clear progress in restoring order" following his convening of the third national security and defence council meeting overnight (Tuesday 21 May).
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a)
  returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- <u>President Macron</u> strongly condemned the "inacceptable violence, destruction, intimidation and assaults against persons, property and law enforcement agents" that has

taken place in New Caledonia for the past three days. Macron has sent an invitation by way of a letter, to New Caledonia's politicians, for a meeting in Paris.

- Erench Prime Minister Gabriel Attal, "Everything is being done to restore order and calm that Caledonians deserve," after a meeting at the presidential palace on Wednesday. He said the situation "remains very tense, with looting, riots, arson and attacks, which are unbearable and unspeakable". Speaking before the National Assembly on Tuesday, underlined the opportunity for those talks to resume and called on New Caledonia's parties to "seize the opportunity of this extended hand" to resume dialogue. "Only dialogue will allow us to appease tensions. Our hand remains extended. We need an inclusive political solution that can satisfy all stakeholders and that's why we are offering New Caledonian leaders to discuss and build together the future of New Caledonia", he told Parliament during question time.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."
- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in

Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."

- <u>Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris</u> appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown (and outgoing PIF Chair said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing secretary-general of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- <u>Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni</u> said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

Macron referred to the 'path of forgiveness' and the 'path to the future', the latter of which was blocked by riots and actions of delinquents, and th political disagreement on electoral reform. He asserted that the electoral reform has 'democratic legitimacy', but promised that it would not be 'forced through'
- After a few weeks of calm, talks could begin, but this would be contingent on the lifting of remaining roadblocks and checkpoints. There would be a 'mediation and work mission' to work out an agreement with local stakeholders in the coming weeks. Macron hoped that the agreement could be 'put to a vote by the people of New Caledonia'.
- The subjects of future negotiations would include: the electoral body, the organisation of power, the distribution of seats, citizenship, inequalities, the economic future including the nickel industry, and the self-determination vote.

- French reinforcements were focused on restoring freedom of movement by removing barricades and hazards; restocking supermarkets and pharmacies, and ensuring the efficient movement of supplies around New Caledonia; and supporting the function of health services, ensuring access was available to those in need.

• French officials have confirmed that there are sufficient provisions of food and medicine. Ministry officials have confirmed that supermarkets are being restocked with some food items.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- International media have started to report more on the situation in New Caledonia.

  Outlets <u>including BBC</u>, <u>CNN</u> <u>and Al Jazeera</u> have covered our first assisted departure flight, alongside Australia's own efforts.
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown noted on RNZ Morning Report yesterday (Thursday 23 May) the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Islands] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview here.
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a) returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias

backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown (and outgoing PIF Chair) said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any

escalation of conflict."

- Henry Puna, outgoing Secretary General of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."
- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

- [If asked about individual cases in the media]: We are unable to comment on individual cases. We are continuing to be in touch directly with New Zealanders in New Caledonia who have indicated they wish to depart.

- In recent days there have been few options available for New Zealanders in more remote parts of New Caledonia to travel to Noumea. The consulate has been working to find options to bring these citizens to Noumea for repatriation. On Friday 24 May, French officials acknowledged New Zealand's strong desire to assist its citizens to depart New Caledonia. They signalled they expect to have puma helicopters available in a few days that can assist New Zealand to collect its citizens from remote areas.
- Following today's assisted departure flight, 108 New Zealanders remain in New Caledonia who wish to depart.

# Media comments by other Leaders

- International media are continuing to report on the situation in New Caledonia. Outlets including BBC, CNN and Al Jazeera covered our first assisted departure flight.
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown noted on RNZ Morning Report on Thursday 23 May the political unrest is 'deeply concerning to the [Pacific Islands] Forum family'. The PIF call is for 'peace and order to prevail so that we can actually engage in genuine dialogue and through the Pacific way of talanoa.' Full interview here.
- New Caledonian representative in the French National Assembly Nicolas Metzdorf s6(a) returned to New Caledonia last night on board a French military plane. In a radio interview on Monday 20 May, Metzdorf labelled the CCAT a "terrorist organisation" and also criticised the state for not being prepared for the current situation. Metzdorf also stated his view that the legislative process to open the electoral roll had to continue; if not it would be giving in to the CCAT, and would mean that their actions had been successful.
- On Friday CCAT (an independence political party) issued a statement calling for "a time of calm to break the spiral of violence". The CCAT issued a new communiqué at midday on Friday. "In the face of the State's stubborn determination to impose constitutional change, we denounce the State's irresponsibility and hold it responsible for the loss of human life, the atrocities and the devastation of the country's economic fabric." The CCAT says it is deeply affected by the loss of these lives, "those of our young people murdered by militias backed by the State and non-independence leaders, and that of the young gendarme". In this press release, the cell coordinating field actions calls for appeasement. "A time for appeasement to halt the escalation of violence." He added: "It's a break in our fight. It

expresses the CCAT's determination to preserve life. We're keeping up the pressure through our presence at phase 2.5 on the ground, maintaining filtering traffic for all citizens."

- Roch Wamytan, President of the Congress of New Caledonia said "The context" is not favourable to "discussions with the President of the Republic", after the cancellation of the videoconference proposed to Caledonian elected representatives by Emmanuel Macron. "How can you discuss with the President of the Republic under these conditions?" he continued. "We accepted the principle of discussions, except that to be able to meet the President of the Republic and listen to what he had to say to us, it was normal to prepare in advance. For me, it wasn't possible to do that today."
- <u>French Justice Minister Eric Dupond-Moretti</u> has called on prosecutors to "take the strongest possible action against the perpetrators of the violence" and also indicated he was considering transferring the "criminals" to mainland France.
- French Home Affairs and Overseas minister Gérald Darmanin told public TV channel France 2 he had placed 10 leaders of the CCAT (an organisation linked with FLNKS) under home detention. "This is a Mafia-like body which I do not amalgamate with political proindependence parties...[CCAT] is a group that claims itself to be pro-independence and commits looting, murders and violence," "I have numerous elements which show this is a Mafia-like, violent organisation that loots stores and shoots real bullets at (French) gendarmes, sets businesses on fire and attacks even pro-independence institutions." "Massive reinforcements were to arrive shortly and the French state would "totally regain control", he said.
- The National Council of Chiefs of the Indigenous Kanak condemned "all acts of vandalism and gun violence", but rejected the allegations that the pro-independence movement was involved in the deadly violence. Grand Chief Hippolyte Sinewami-Htamumu expressed full support for the pro-independence group, which has mobilised more than a hundred thousand people "of all ages and from all backgrounds" in peaceful protests in recent months in the capital, Nouméa, and throughout the island. "This is not a 'terrorist group' or 'mafia group', as certain political leaders want us to believe."
- Romuald Pidjo, from the CCAT's [a pro-independence political group] Kanak delegation in Paris, on the anger of young people in Nouméa's working-class neighbourhoods [where some of the worst violence has taken place]. "These are people who are very disadvantaged, people who have been left behind. And what do they see, all these people, every day? They see people who've come from mainland France, who have big cars. And they have nothing! The straw that broke the camel's back was this constitutional bill in which the state is going to say: 'We're going to continue to bring in people who are going to crush you, who are going to take everything in this country'."
- Leaders of a Kanak Workers Union in Paris appealed for calm and said they were deeply saddened by deaths in their faraway homeland. "We wish to see the French government make a strong political statement rather than send troops," union leader Rock Haocas told reporters. "Starting a conversation would be a strong political statement."
- Cook Islands Prime Minister Mark Brown (and outgoing PIF Chair) said greater autonomy for the indigenous Kanak population is needed. "If there's one thing that specific countries value, it is the sovereignty and independence. To be able to have control over the destiny of your own country." "My initial view of the unrest that's occurring in Caledonia, it is cause to recognise greater autonomy and greater independence from the people on those islands. "As a member of the Forum now, we will be able to provide support assistance to these member countries as to the best way forward without trying to try to avoid any escalation of conflict."
- Henry Puna, outgoing Secretary General of the Pacific Islands Forum told journalists at his

final news conference that "to see the collapse [and], protesting is very unfortunate", but it was predictable. He said the issue "has been boiling" since the 2021 independence referendum in the French territory, the third and final vote under the Nouméa Accord, which was boycotted by the pro-indigenous Kanak population. He said he was there in December 2021 to monitor the independence referendum when it was taken and "it was unfortunate that it was allowed to go ahead during that time". "We were in the middle of [the] Covid [pandemic] and the Kanak custom is that when somebody passes they mourn that for one year. So they weren't allowed that freedom. "As a result, they didn't want to take part in the referendum because they couldn't go against their tradition and go campaigning or do other work. That's disrespectful for the custom."

- Vanuatu's prime minister, Charlot Salwai (also chairman of the Melanesian Spearhead Group, which also includes Fiji, Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands) said the indiscriminate destruction of property would affect New Caledonia's economy in a big way and have a cascading effect on the lives of all New Caledonians, including Kanaks. He said France should establish dialogue with FLNKS, which has condemned the violence, and annul the constitutional reform that sparked the crisis. "These events could have been avoided if the French government had listened."
- Australia's foreign affairs minister, Penny Wong, said Australians were advised to reconsider their need to travel to New Caledonia due to "civil unrest, travel disruption and limited essential services". "Again I repeat and take this opportunity to repeat Australia's call for calm. We respect and support the referendum process ... and the discussions under way between all parties, and encourage all parties to work together cooperatively to shape the future of New Caledonia."
- Labour Party Deputy Leader Carmel Sepuloni said the growing unrest was a concern. At last year's Pacific Islands Forum, French Polynesian representatives were already expressing concern about how some policies from the French government might affect its indigenous population, she said.

• French President Macron held a press conference in Nouméa on 24 May. He said the French Government's objective was to restore calm and order as quickly as possible, and not give in to violence. Macron referred to the 'path of forgiveness' and the 'path to the future', the latter of which was blocked by riots and actions of delinquents, and the political disagreement on electoral

reform. He asserted that the electoral reform has 'democratic legitimacy', but promised that it would not be 'forced through'.

- After a few weeks of calm, talks could begin, but this would be contingent on the lifting of remaining roadblocks and checkpoints. There would be a 'mediation and work mission' to work out an agreement with local stakeholders in the coming weeks. Macron hoped that the agreement could be 'put to a vote by the people of New Caledonia'.
