- Honiara, Solomon Islands to officially open the new New Zealand High Commission 1 chancery and visit New Zealand development projects being implemented;
- Proactively released by the Parliamentary Under Se Vanuatu to visit New Zealand development projects being implemented.

## OVERSEAS TRAVEL: UNDER-SECRETARY FLETCHER TABUTEAU: **OCTOBER 2019**

I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel to Vanuatu and Solomon Islands from 20-24 October 2019.

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- New Zealand's objectives for the visit were:

  Officially open the /-- Officially open the (new) New Zealand High Commission chancery in Honiara, Solomon Islands.
  - As part of the Pacific Reset, advance New Zealand's focus on building mature political partnerships with Pacific Island countries, by engaging with key political, business and community stakeholders.
  - Visit New Zealand development projects being implemented in Solomon Islands and Vanuatu, which are targeted at building state capability, enhancing economic opportunities and improving human development.
  - Reinforce New Zealand's commitment to Pacific regionalism and advancing collective solutions to regional issues.
  - Reiterate New Zealand's commitment to PACER Plus as a key enabler of economic development in Pacific countries.
  - Build on the visits to both countries in 2019 as part of the Pacific Mission, by reinforcing relationships with key stakeholders.
- In Solomon Islands, I formally inaugurated the New Zealand Embassy at a well-attended launch event and pursued New Zealand interests in discussions with senior contacts in government, business and other priority sectors. s6(a), s6(b)

During his speech at the

koleigh Affaire launch event, Prime Minister Sogavare spoke positively about the bilateral relationship noting the longevity and genuine closeness of the ties, saying "New Zealand has been, is, and always will be a friend to Solomon Islands."

- Other high-level engagements included a lunch hosted by the supervising 4. Minister of Foreign Affairs and the Minister of Communications and Aviation, Hon. Peter Shanel Agovaka. This provided an opportunity to exchange views on topics of interest to New Zealand including, aviation, connectivity and third country relations.
- As part of New Zealand's support for Solomon Islands' fisheries sector, I 5. visited the Ministry of Fisheries and Marine Resources and the Director-General of the Forum Fisheries Agency. While there I signed a Grant Funding Arrangement for New Zealand's new tranche of support to the Ministry of Fisheries and Marine Resources for NZ \$7m over the next five years. I took the opportunity to register New Zealand's commitment to regional solidarity, in areas like fisheries, in order to maximise economic benefits and mitigate risks.
- The visit also provided the opportunity to profile and assess the progress of New Zealand funded development projects. This included a site tour of the Honiara Multi-Purpose Hall facilities (a safe space for Solomon Islands' youth), which New Zealand is partnering with the Honiara City Council to upgrade, and a visit to the New Zealand funded Fred Hollows Regional Eye Clinic.
- The visit to Vanuatu featured a bilateral meeting and dinner with Minister of Foreign Affairs, Hon. Ralph Regenvanu. This afforded an opportunity to register New Zealand's ongoing commitment to PACER Plus (and support for Vanuatu to ratify the agreement) and New Zealand's commitment to labour mobility through the Recognised Seasonal Employers Scheme. |s6(a), s6(b)|

Minister Regenvanu applauded New Zealand for the Pacific Reset noting that since it had been announced, New Zealand's engagement in Vanuatu had changed positively.

- 8. Jotham Napat, enabled a wide-ranging discussion on Vanuatu's strategy for growing its tourism sector, including how Vanuatu could learn from New Zealand.
- The rest of the visit focused on assessing the progress of New Zealand red development initiatives in Vanuatu. Highlights included a visit to "al Office to assess New Zealand's support to Vanuatu. Seneral Elections and a field to u to eradic 9. supported development initiatives in Vanuatu. Highlights included a visit to the Electoral Office to assess New Zealand's support to Vanuatu as it prepares for the 2020 General Elections and a field visit to see how New Zealand has supported Vanuatu to eradicate a destructive species of the coconut rhinoceros beetle.
