Highlights:

- Budget 2022 was announced yesterday (19 May) and includes a \$1 billion cost-of-living package, an \$11.1 billion operating budget for Health NZ over the next four years, and \$777 million in capital investment for new classrooms.
- The cost-of-living package includes a one-off payment of \$350 to an estimated 2.1 million people in the low to middle-income section, an extensions of the 25c a litre fuel tax cut, and half-price public transport for another two months. Read more here.

Regional Updates

Domestic Updates:

- Prime Minister Ardern has tested positive for COVID-19. She has been in isolation since Sunday 8 May.
 As a result the Prime Minister will be required to isolate until the morning of Saturday 21 May. She was not in Parliament this week for the release of the Government's Emissions Reduction Plan on Monday or for the Budget on Thursday. Travel arrangements for her trade mission to the United States remain unaffected at this stage.
- Minister of State for Trade and Export Growth, Hon Phil Twyford, has also tested positive for COVID-19. As a result he was no longer able to travel to Timor-Leste on Monday 16 May, where he was to represent the Government at the 20th Anniversary of Timor-Leste's independence, and the inauguration of Dr Jose Ramos-Horta as Timor-Leste's next President. New Zealand's ambassador to Timor-Leste, Philip Hewitt, instead represented the New Zealand Government at these events.
- Trade and Export Growth Minister Damien O'Connor is set to travel to Thailand this week to represent New Zealand at the annual APEC Ministers Responsible for Trade (MRT) meeting in Bangkok. According to Minister O'Connor "Front of mind for APEC economies this year will be economic recovery in the post-COVID-19 era, navigating the economic fallout of Russia's war on Ukraine and other key trade issues for the Indo-Pacific region, such as demonstrating support for World Trade Organization ahead of its Twelfth Ministerial Conference (MC12) in June". Australia and the Pacific:

- The Australian Federal Election goes to the polls tomorrow (21 May). Over 6.5 million people of the 17 million eligible voters have already either cast an early vote or applied for a postal vote, according to the <u>Australian Electoral Commission</u>.
- Australian company Penfolds has announced it will be launching a wine grown and made in China,

targeted at 52 million regular wine drinkers. The 'made in China' wine is Penfolds first step into locally produced wine, and will be released later this year only for the domestic China market at this stage. This is part of the company's strategy to diversify the country-of-origin of their products to avoid high import tariffs.

Sāmoa has reduced COVID-19 restrictions further as part of its latest Alert Level decision. Curfews
have been dropped, travel to Sāmoa will now be managed on a commercial basis and schools will open
progressively over the coming month. Travellers are now able to self-isolate rather than enter MIQ.
Currently only Sāmoan nationals and foreign workers with visas are permitted to enter Sāmoa. The
border will open to all travellers from 1 August and we expect the frequency of flights to increase from
July/August.

Asia:

- Sri Lanka's Prime Minster Mahinda Rajapaksa resigned on 9 May, amidst violence breaking out in Colombo. Since then, Ranil Wickremesinghe was sworn as Sri Lanka's Prime Minister for the sixth time, having been chosen by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa over the other leading candidate, Leader of the Opposition Sajith Premadasa. One of the major short-term issues facing Prime Minister Wickremesinghe will be to stabilise the Sri Lankan economy.
- China retail sales and industrial production declined 11.1 percent and 2.1 percent year-on-year respectively. This comes admist China's ongoing use of zero-COVID measures to eliminate community transmission, with lockdowns persisting in Shanghai and increased restrictions in Beijing.
- On 8 May, John Lee was elected Hong Kong's next Chief Executive. As the only candidate, Lee cleaned
 up in elections with 99% of the eligible votes. Of the 1428 election committee members, 1416 voted in
 favour, four cast blank votes, and eight voted against Lee. New Zealand tweeted its concerns about the
 selection
- Results from the 9 May Philippines election race indicate that Ferdinand 'Bongbong' Marcos Jr is on track
 to win the presidency. On domestic policy of relevance to New Zealand interests, Marcos is interested in
 growing energy supply and expanding geothermal and hydroelectric energy.

Americas:

Canada intends to implement changes to its dairy tariff-rate quota system under the U.S. – Mexico –
Canada Agreement (USMCA), despite the Biden administration's claims that the proposed changes will
not comply with the agreement. Read more here.

Europe:

- The legislation needed to ratify the Australia and New Zealand trade agreements with the UK was mentioned in the Queen's Speech at the State Opening of Parliament in London on 10 May, signaling its importance in the UK's legislative programme. The Trade (Australia and New Zealand) Bill has now completed its first reading in the UK House of Commons. New Zealand will also need to pass legislation to allow for entry into force of the FTA. New Zealand's NZ-UK FTA Bill is expected to be introduced to the NZ House of Representatives mid-year.
- Austria has removed all COVID-19 entry restrictions. From 16 May 2022 travellers, irrespective of
 country of origin or purpose of travel, are no longer required to show proof of vaccination or negative
 test (or provide an alternative pre-travel clearance form) to enter Austria.
